• 10:1-11

In this vision John sees an angel with a scroll in his hand. John takes the scroll which subsequently he is told to eat.

• 10:1-4

¹ Then I saw another mighty angel coming down from heaven, wrapped in a cloud, with a rainbow over his head, and his face was like the sun, and his legs like pillars of fire. ² He had a little scroll open in his hand. And he set his right foot on the sea, and his left foot on the land, ³ and called out with a loud voice, like a lion roaring. When he called out, the seven thunders sounded. ⁴ And when the seven thunders had sounded, I was about to write, but I heard a voice from heaven saying, "Seal up what the seven thunders have said, and do not write it down."

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• 10:5-7

⁵ And the angel whom I saw standing on the sea and on the land <u>raised his right hand to heaven</u> ⁶ <u>and swore by him who lives forever and ever, who created [the sky] and what is in it, the [land] and what is in it, and the sea and what is in it, that there would be no more delay, ⁷ but that in the days of the trumpet call to be sounded by the seventh angel, the mystery of God would be fulfilled, just as he announced to his servants the prophets.</u>

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Psalm 2:7-9 – ⁷ I will tell of the decree: The LORD said to me, "You are my Son; today I have begotten you. ⁸ Ask of me, and <u>I will make the nations your heritage</u>, and <u>the ends of the earth your possession</u>. ⁹ You shall break them with a rod of iron and dash them in pieces like a potter's vessel."

Isaiah 2:2 – It shall come to pass in the latter days that the mountain of the house of the LORD shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be lifted up above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it.

Zechariah 14:1, 4, 8-9 – ¹ Behold, a day is coming for the LORD ⁴ On that day his feet shall stand on the Mount of Olives ³ On that day living waters shall flow out from Jerusalem ³ And the LORD will be king over all the earth. On that day the LORD will be one and his name one.

• 10:8-10

8 Then the voice that I had heard from heaven spoke to me again, saying, "Go, take the scroll that is open in the hand of the angel who is standing on the sea and on the land." 9 So I went to the angel and told him to give me the little scroll. And he said to me, "Take and eat it; it will make your stomach bitter, but in your mouth it will be sweet as honey."

10 And I took the little scroll from the hand of the angel and ate it. It was sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I had eaten it my stomach was made bitter.

- 10:8-10
 - What is the point of this "eating-the-scroll lesson" for John?

• 10:8-10

"The act of eating the scroll symbolized the absorbing and assimilating of God's Word When John took in the divine word concerning the remaining judgments as the Lord took possession of the universe, he found the words ... both sweet as honey and bitter. Sweet because John, like all believers, wanted the Lord to act in judgment to take back the earth that is rightfully His and be exalted, honored, and glorified as He deserved. But the realization of the terrible doom awaiting unbelievers turned that initial sweet taste into bitterness." (MacArthur, Revelation 1-11)

• 10:11

¹¹ And <u>I was told</u>, "You must again prophesy about many peoples and nations and languages and kings."

• 11:1-13

This vision starts with more involvement by John as he measures the earthly temple. It then moves on to describe activities associated with two men who are called "my two witnesses."

• 11:1-3

¹ Then I was given a measuring rod like a staff, and I was told, "Rise and measure the temple of God and the altar and those who worship there, ² but do not measure the court outside the temple; leave that out, for it is given over to the nations, and they will trample the holy city for forty-two months. ³ And I will grant authority to my two witnesses, and they will prophesy for 1,260 days, clothed in sackcloth."

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"The act of measuring seems to signify that the area belongs to God in some special way. It is an evaluation of his property." (Walvoord, *The Revelation of Jesus Christ*)

"John's measuring of the temple symbolized the marking out of the believing Jewish remnant that God would spare from judgment." (John MacArthur, Revelation 1-11)

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• 11:4-6

⁴ These are the two olive trees and the two lampstands that stand before the Lord of the earth. ⁵ And if anyone would harm them, fire pours from their mouth and consumes their foes. If anyone would harm them, this is how he is doomed to be killed. ⁶ They have the power to shut the sky, that no rain may fall during the days of their prophesying, and they have power over the waters to turn them into blood and to strike the [land] with every kind of plague, as often as they desire.

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• 11:7-8

⁷ And when they have finished their testimony, the beast that rises from the bottomless pit will make war on them and conquer them and kill them, ⁸ and their dead bodies will lie in the street of the great city that symbolically is called Sodom and Egypt, where their Lord was crucified.

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• 11:9-10

⁹ For three and a half days some from the peoples and tribes and languages and nations will gaze at their dead bodies and refuse to let them be placed in a tomb, ¹⁰ and those who dwell on the earth will rejoice over them and make merry and exchange presents, because these two prophets had been a torment to those who dwell on the earth.

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• 11:11-12

11 But <u>after the three and a half days a breath of life from</u>

God entered them, and they stood up on their feet, and great fear fell on those who saw them. 12 Then they heard a loud voice from heaven saying to them, "Come up here!"

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• 11:13

13 And at that hour there was a great earthquake, and a tenth of the city fell. Seven thousand people were killed in the earthquake, and the rest were terrified and gave glory to the God of heaven.
