The Woman and the Dragon - 12:1-17

The visions in chapter 12 describe two primary characters and interactions between them. One is a woman, picturing Israel, and the other is a dragon, picturing Satan.

- John sees a sign. In this case it's a woman. (12:1)
 - The description of this woman and what follows leads to the conclusion this woman pictures God's people, Israel, at various points in the nation's history.
 - She is seen as pregnant, ready to give birth. (12:2)
- John sees a second sign. In this case it's a "great red dragon." (12:3)
 - This dragon is clearly identified in 12:9.
 - The dragon is describes as having seven heads and ten horns and seven diadems.
 - Some, like MacArthur, see the 7 heads as world empires that have interacted with Israel. They include: Egypt, Assyria, Babylon, Medo-Persia, Greece, Rome, and Antichrist's future empire.
 - The sweeping by his tail of the stars is thought to be an historical allusion to Satan's fall and those who followed him. (12:4)
 - The dragon is poised before the pregnant woman waiting to kill her offspring when she delivers. (12:4)
 - This was fulfilled when through the agency of Herod when all male children under two were killed.
- The woman gives birth to a male child. (12:5)
 - o This was fulfilled at the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem.
 - o This child would rule the nations. Cf. Psalm 2:8-9.
 - This child was taken up to God, referring to his ascension after his death and resurrection.
- At this point what John sees moves to the future, even our future.
- The woman is next seen as fleeing into the wilderness.
 - \circ There she is cared for by God for 1,260 days, the 2nd half of the 70th week.
- John now provides background information to help us understand the woman's flight. (12:7-9)

- In a war between Michael and the dragon, the dragon is defeated with the result that he is confined to the earth.
 - Along with the dragon, Satan, are his angels (demons).
- With the ejection of Satan, we see announced the initiation of God's taking back all control from Satan. (12:10)
 - \circ This is apparently fully realized at the sounding of the 7^{th} trumpet. (11:15)
- The one who has accused "our brothers" has been conquered. His defeat is a cause for rejoicing. (12:11-12)
 But it's a woe to those on the earth.
- It is because the dragon has been thrown down that he pursues the woman. (12:13)
- On behalf of the woman who is fleeing, God intervenes as the dragon seeks to destroy her. (12:14-16)
- Finally, recognizing God's protection for the woman in the wilderness, the dragon turns to "make war on the rest of her offspring." (12:17).
 - These "offspring" are the remaining Jews still spread among the nations.

The First Beast - 13:1-10

John sees a beast rising out of the sea. This beast from the sea represents both the Antichrist and his kingdom. Beyond Revelation, this beast is mentioned numerous times in both Testaments.

- John sees a beast from the sea that has ten horns and seven heads and 10 diadems. (13:1)
 - The 10 horns apparently represent 10 kings associated with the beast. Cf. Daniel 2:40-43; 7:7, 8, 24.
 - The 7 heads represent 7 world empires. Cf. list above on 12:3.
 - However, the beast itself will sometimes represent the 7th empire, an empire that leads to an 8th one.
- John describes the character of the beast and the power that has been given to it (13:2).
 - The description is very much like the first three beasts described by Daniel (Daniel 7:4-6).
- As John focuses on the 7th head, he describes it as having a "mortal wound" that has healed. (13:3)
 - As a kingdom, the 7th form (regional) will transition to an 8th form (global).

- As a king, the Antichrist will suffer a "mortal" wound that is healed.
 - Perhaps this is some sort of "resurrection" at which "the whole earth marveled."
- Those on the earth worship both the dragon (Satan) and the beast (Antichrist). (13:4)
 - MacArthur notes that this worship of Satan may be carried out "wittingly or unwittingly." In either case, they are worshiping both.
- Even though the beast is boastful and profane in his speaking against God, he is given authority. (13:5-6)
 - As evidenced by the "forty-two months," it is God who sovereignly permits him to have authority.
 - His authority permits him to war on and conquer the saints. (13:7)
 - His authority extends over the entire earth. (13:7)
- As a result of his position, all those on the entire earth will worship him. (13:8)
 - That is, all except the elect.
- At this point John addresses his readers and issues a call for endurance and faith (13:9-10)
 - With these words of comfort, saints are encouraged to "hold on" and to "keep the faith," knowing that God's plans will be accomplished.

The Second Beast - 13:11-18

John sees a beast rising out of the land. This 2^{nd} beast, after this chapter 13, is known as the False Prophet. Unlike the 1^{st} beast, this beast does not seem to be mentioned outside of the book of Revelation.

- John sees a beast rising from the land having two horns and speaking like a dragon. (13:11)
- This 2nd beast exercises authority derived from the 1st beast. (13:12)
 - Using this authority, he forces the world to worship the 1st beast.
- This 2nd beast can perform great signs (13:13-14)
 - This includes "making fire come down from heaven."
 - These signs are performed "in the presence of the [1st] beast." Cf. 2 Thessalonians 2:9-10 where signs are associated with "the lawless one."

- Through these deceptive signs, the 2nd has an image of the 1st beast created.
- This 2nd beast "was allowed to give breath to the image." (13:15)
 - "Was allowed" by whom? Directly, most likely by Satan, but ultimately, by God.
 - o The image has the appearance of being alive.
 - It this image alive? Probably no, but perhaps yes.
 And, even if "alive," it would not be human.
- This 2nd beast "causes all ... to be marked." (13:16-17)
 - This mark determines who can transact business, buying or selling.
 - This will make it difficult for believers (and any others) who will not accept this mark.
 - This mark is "the name of the [1st] beast or the number of its name." This number is stated in 13:18.
 - The "mark" could be a tattoo or an RFID tag or both, or something else.
- Like 13:9-10, John addresses his readers. Here he issues a call for wisdom. (13:18)
 - This call involves understanding the number of the 1st beast.
 - We must accept that "the one who has understanding" does not include us today. It will make sense to those living at that time.
 - That number is "the number of a man, and his number is 666."
 - What is the significance of this number? There have been many guesses. Simply stated, today no one knows. But we don't need to know.
